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Introduction to the PayPal Shopping Cart

How the PayPal Shopping Cart can help your online store

Put a PayPal Shopping Cart on your website!

When you use PayPal's free Shopping Cart, your customers can purchase multiple items with a single payment, browse your entire selection, and view a consolidated list of all their items before purchasing. The PayPal Shopping Cart is a low-cost way for you to accept credit card and bank account payments, and can be fully integrated with your website in a few easy steps.

Save time and money with PayPal's hassle-free Shopping Cart:

- Easy to implement — no CGI scripting necessary
- No up-front costs — you'll have the same low fee schedule as when you receive other PayPal payments
- Sell with ease — PayPal maintains detailed transaction records on our website

The PayPal Shopping Cart also offers customizable buttons and secure payments to help you improve your buyer experience, so happy customers become repeat customers.

Get the most out of your website today: start using the PayPal Shopping Cart!

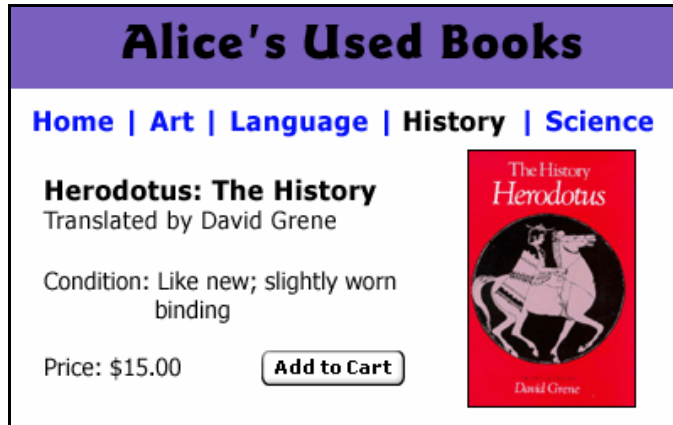
How it Works

A visual tour of the PayPal Shopping Cart

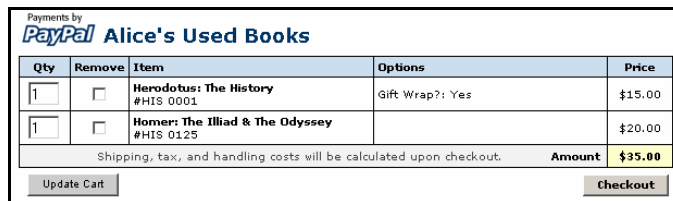
Bob, who is new to PayPal, is going to purchase several books from Alice's website.

What Your Customer Sees

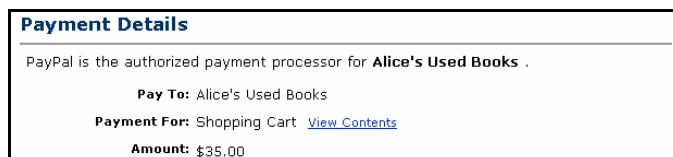
Step 1: Bob goes to Alice's website and presses the "Add to Cart" button. When he has chosen all of the books he wants, he presses the "View Cart" button.



Step 2: Bob looks at the contents of his cart and presses the "Checkout" button.



Step 3: Bob is taken to a PayPal Payment Details page which shows the items he has added to his Cart.





Step 4: Bob is prompted to login to his PayPal account, but he is not already a PayPal member, so he follows the instructions at the top of the screen.

Step 6: Bob is taken to a Confirmation page containing the details of his payment. Because Alice has activated her Shipping Preferences, the Shipping costs are automatically added to Bob's order. He includes a short note to Alice and presses the "Pay" button to complete payment.

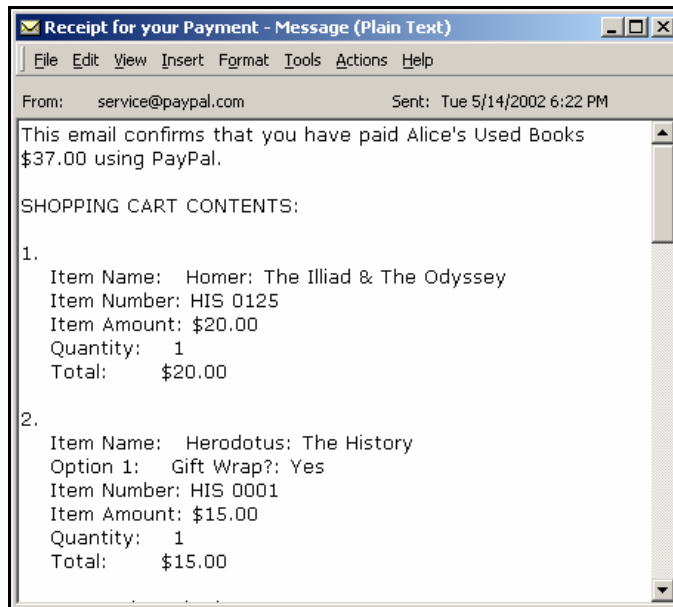

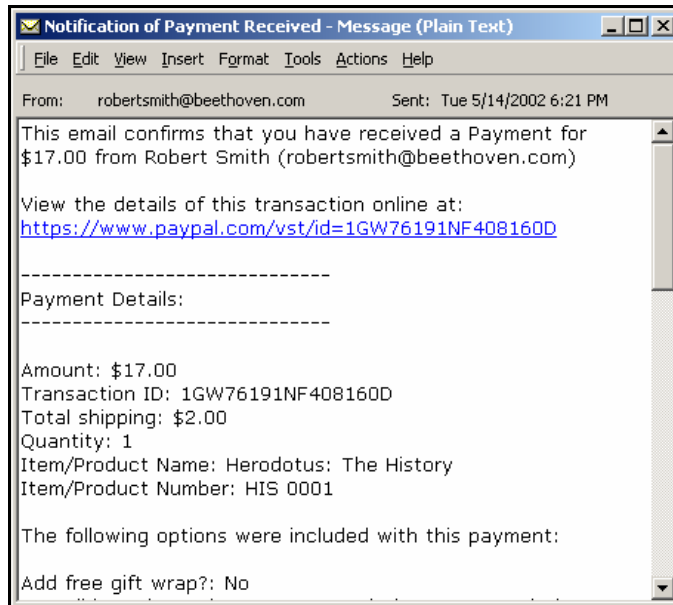

PayPal Shopping Cart Button Factory

A step-by-step guide to implementing the PayPal Shopping Cart

With the PayPal Shopping Cart, your buyers can make a single payment when they purchase multiple items.

And it's easy to set up and use: Just create a separate "Add to Cart" button for each item you sell, and place the automatically generated HTML for that button on your website next to the item.

Getting Started:

- Login to your PayPal account at www.paypal.com
- Click on the "Merchant Tools" tab
- Select the "PayPal Shopping Cart" link under the "Website Payments" heading to get to the Button Factory

1. Enter the details for the item you wish to sell

Item Name/Service

Required field

Enter the name of the item or service you wish to sell.

Item ID/Number

If you have an ID or tracking number for your item, enter it here. This field will be displayed to your customers at the time of payment, and will be shown in both the buyer's and seller's transaction details on the PayPal website.

Item Price

Required field

Enter the price of the item you wish to sell.

Currency

Required field

Choose the currency in which you would like this payment to be denominated. This field will default to the currency of your primary balance.

Note: All items added to a PayPal Shopping Cart must be denominated in a single currency, which is determined by the currency specified for the first item added to the Cart. Once one item is added to a Cart, buyers will not be allowed to add any items listed in other currencies to that Cart. To change the currency, buyers must either Checkout and purchase the items in the first currency, or remove all existing items from the Cart and add the items of the

second currency. (The best option is to list all of your items in the same currency.)

2. Choose an image for your “Add to Cart” button

If you are going to be receiving payments from your website, choose the image for the button you would like your customers to press to make their purchase. To display your own image, enter the URL of the image’s location in the URL field.

If you do not have additional details to add to your button (such as sales tax, shipping, or your logo), click **Create Button Now**. Otherwise, click **Add More Options**.

3. Shipping and Tax

Shipping Cost Calculation

If you have already specified shipping rates in your Profile, they will be listed here. To learn more about charging for shipping, please see “Calculating Shipping and Tax” on page 15.

Sales or Value Added Tax Calculation

If you have already specified your tax rate from your Profile, it will be listed here. To learn more about charging for tax, please see “Calculating Shipping and Tax” on page 15.

4. Add Option fields to your button

Let your customers specify information about their purchases by creating an option field. You can use Option fields to specify information such as color, size, or gift wrapping. Options **must not** change the price of an item, but let you collect additional information from your customer without extra email communication. Each Buy Now Button may have up to two option fields, and you may use a drop-down menu or text box to collect the information.

Unfortunately, Option fields cannot currently be used if you are creating an email hyperlink. If you would still like to send out Buy Now links in emails, you may try sending an HTML email, providing a link to the Buy Now Button (with Option fields) on your website, or asking your user to include the optional information in the “Note” field.

Option Field Type

Choose the type of option field: drop-down menu or text box. If you choose drop-down menu, you will enter the different choices. If you choose text box, your customer will enter his choice.

Option Name

Enter the name of your option. There is a 60-character limit on Option Names.

Drop-Down Menu Choices

If you are using a drop-down menu, enter your menu choices. There is a 30-character limit per choice, with a maximum of 10 choices. Use a carriage return (press 'Enter') to separate each choice.

5. Select a "View Cart" button

If you are going to be receiving payments from your website, choose the image for the button you would like your customers to press to check out and complete their purchase. To display your own image, enter the URL of the image's location in the URL field.

6. Customize Your Payment Pages**Add Your Logo**

Customize the look of your PayPal payment pages by adding your logo. This image, which must be **150 by 50 pixels** in size, will appear in the upper left-hand corner of the page when your customer presses your PayPal Shopping Cart button.

If your image is hosted on a secure server (if the URL begins with "https:"), select the "https:" radio button. If your image is hosted on a non-secure server (if the URL begins with "http:"), select the "http:" radio button. We recommend hosting your image on a secure server, which will improve the performance of the PayPal payment pages.

If you leave this field blank, your Company Name (if you have a Business account) or your email address (if you have a Premier account) will appear in large font in the upper right-hand corner of your payment pages, and PayPal's logo will appear in the upper left.

Choose the Background Color

Customize the look of your PayPal payment pages by changing the background color. The pages can have either a white (default) or a black background. Just select the radio button next to your background color of choice.

7. Customize Your Buyer Experience

Successful Payment URL

Enter the URL where you would like to send your customers after they have completed payment. Once your customer has completed his payment, he will see a payment confirmation page. From this page, he will press the "Continue" button and return to the Successful Payment URL you have specified. If you do not enter a Successful Payment URL, customers who click this link will be taken to a PayPal webpage.

Cancel Payment URL

Enter the URL where you would like to send your customers if they cancel their payment at any point in the PayPal Shopping Cart payment flow. If you do not enter a Cancel Payment URL, customers who click this link will be taken to a PayPal webpage.

8. Other Options

Shipping Address

If you would like your customers to be prompted to provide a shipping address, choose "Yes". If you choose "No", your customers will not be asked to provide a shipping address.

9. Collect additional information from your customers

Note

Select "Yes" if you would like your customers to be able to include a note to you with their payment. If you select "No," your customers will not be given the opportunity to include a note.

Note Title

If you are allowing your customers to include a note with their payment, you may choose a title for the note field. By including a title, you can prompt your buyers to enter specific information (like a User ID) or special instructions. There is a 40-character limit on your note field title. If you do not enter a title, your customers will see 'Special Instructions (optional)' as the note field title.

10. Choose an email address to receive payment

If you have more than one confirmed email address attached to your PayPal account, you can specify the address at which you would like to receive your email payment notifications when your customers pay you.

11. Copy and Paste the PayPal Shopping Cart code

When you have finished filling out the PayPal Shopping Cart Button Factory form, press the "Continue" button.

Copy the code from the first text box (titled "For Webpages") by highlighting all of the text and pressing Ctrl+C, or by highlighting all of the text, right-clicking on your mouse, and choosing Copy.

In your website files, open the code for the webpage from which you wish to collect payment.

Paste the code you just copied into your webpage file wherever you would like the button to appear (typically, next to the description of the item or service) by either pressing Ctrl+V or by right-clicking on your mouse and selecting the paste option.

HTML Tips:

Please ensure that the HTML code on your webpage exactly matches the code you copied from PayPal. Some HTML editors may add, delete, or change some characters in your code. If this is the case, change the code on your webpage to exactly match the code you copied.

Be sure that when you paste the HTML code for your button, you are pasting this information into a field that accepts HTML code. If you paste this code into a standard text field, the code will be posted on your webpage as text.

For more tips on placing your Add to Cart button on your webpage, please see the FAQ on page 23, or see the Help section of your webpage editor.

10. Create "Add to Cart" buttons for all of your items

Press the button titled "Create Another Button" to create more "Add to Cart" buttons following steps 1-5 above. Once you have created "Add to Cart" buttons for all of the items you are selling, proceed to Step 7.

11. Copy the “View Cart” button HTML:

Now that you have placed your “Add to Cart” buttons on your website, you will need to include the “View Cart” buttons so your customers may quickly proceed to Checkout when they are ready.

Copy the code from the “Copy ‘View Cart’ button HTML” box by highlighting all of the text and pressing Ctrl+C, or by highlighting all of the text, right-clicking on your mouse, and choosing Copy.

In your website files, open the code for each webpage from which you would like your customers to be able to get to their PayPal Shopping Carts.

Paste the code you just copied into your webpage file where you would like your ‘View Cart’ button to appear by either pressing Ctrl+V or by right-clicking on your mouse and selecting the paste option.

12. Testing your PayPal Shopping Cart

Now that you have the HTML code in your website, you should test it out. Use your “Add to Cart” buttons to add some items to your cart, then press the “View Cart” button.

Because your PayPal user information is saved in a cookie¹ on your computer, you will see your own PayPal username. Your customers will not see your username. Instead:

If your customer is already a PayPal member, he will see his PayPal username here.

If your customer is not yet a PayPal member, he will see a signup page. To view this from your computer, click the link that says “If you are not Bob Smith, [Click Here](#)”

Remember: you will not be able to test the full payment flow, as the PayPal system does not permit you to make a payment to yourself. To view a sample payment flow, see “How it Works” on page 3.

¹ Cookie: A cookie is information that a website puts on your hard disk so that it can remember something about you when you visit the website later. For more information, see “What Is a Cookie?” in the FAQ section at the end of this manual.

13. How You Get Your Money

After your customer has made his payment:

1. You will receive an email notification of the payment.
2. Your customer will receive an email receipt for the payment.
3. Your PayPal account will reflect the payment (you can view this information from your Account History or download it as part of your History transaction log).

Calculating Shipping and Tax

How to automatically charge shipping and tax

You can set up your PayPal account to automatically calculate and charge shipping and sales (or value added) tax.

Getting Started:

- Login to your PayPal account at www.paypal.com
- Click on the "Profile" subtab of the "My Account" tab
- Choose either 'Tax/Value Added Tax' or 'Shipping Calculation' in the 'Selling Preferences' column

Sales or Value Added Tax Collection

You can charge your customers sales tax by choosing a Country (e.g. United Kindgom) or State (e.g. California) from the "Country" and "U.S. State" drop-down menus, and entering your Tax Rate for that state in the Tax Rate field. Press the "Update Preferences" button to save your changes. **Please Note:** If you are entering the rate for a U.S. state, you will need to make sure the "Country" drop-down menu is set to "United States."

All of your customers who reside in the country or state you selected will automatically be charged the sales tax rate you chose. You can specify a different sales tax rate for each of the 50 U.S. states and any of the countries listed. PayPal does not automatically calculate sales tax rates because they can vary by city.

Shipping Calculation

Determine whether you would like to charge your customers for Shipping as a flat amount or a percentage of the total purchase amount.

Flat Amount

The flat amount is charged based on the subtotal of a purchase.

Example 1: Flat Amount Shipping Calculation

Your flat amount settings are:

\$10.00-\$49.99 = \$3.00

\$50.00-\$99.99 = \$6.00

If your customer's subtotal is \$36.50, he will be charged \$3.00 for shipping, making his total purchase \$39.50

If your customer's subtotal is \$66.50, he will be charged \$6.00 for shipping, making his total purchase \$72.50

Choose the Flat Amount radio button (with the \$ beneath it), and enter a flat amount for each dollar amount increment. Press the "Update Preferences" button to save your changes.

Percentage

The percentage is charged based on the subtotal of a purchase.

Example 1: Percentage Shipping Calculation

Your percentage settings are:

\$10.00-\$49.99 = 5%

\$50.00-\$99.99 = 4%

If your customer's subtotal is \$36.50, he will be charged \$1.83 for shipping, making his total purchase \$38.33

If your customer's subtotal is \$66.50, he will be charged \$2.66 for shipping, making his total purchase \$69.16

Choose the Percentage radio button (with the % beneath it), and enter a percentage for each dollar amount increment. Press the "Update Preferences" button to save your changes.

Overriding Your Shipping Calculation

In some cases, you may want to set a special shipping rate for an item (e.g. if the item is especially heavy and costs more to ship or if it is a service which does not require shipping charges). To charge a different shipping amount for an item, include the shipping cost in the HTML code for that Single Item

Purchase button (using the `shipping` and `shipping2` variables; for more information, see page 26).

To make sure that the shipping code included in your Buy Now Button overrides your Profile Shipping Calculation settings:

- Go to the 'Shipping Calculations' page in your Profile
- Click the 'Click here to allow transaction-based shipping values to override the profile shipping settings listed above (if profile settings are enabled)' check box
- Click Save

Notifications You Will Receive

How you will be notified of payments

You can be notified of payments in these four ways: email, history transaction log, downloadable history transaction log, and (if you have activated it) IPN.

Emails

You will receive an email notification in the following cases:

- Successful Payment
- Pending Payment
- Cancelled Payment

If you do not want to receive payment notifications via email, go to the "Profile" subtab of the "My Account" tab and select the "Notifications" link from the left-hand menu. Find the 'Payment Notifications' heading and uncheck the 'I received a PayPal Website Payments or Auction Logo payment' box, then click 'Save.'

History

Your transaction history log ("History") contains information about your payments.

The "Status" column of a Payment contain the following terms:

Completed — The payment has been completed

Unclaimed — The payment has not cleared the sender's bank account

Cancelled — The payment has not cleared the sender's bank account

Failed — The payment did not clear the sender's bank account.

Downloadable Logs

Download Payment History

Log in to your PayPal account, go to the "History" subtab of the "My Account" tab and choose the "Download Log" link in the "Quick Links" menu. Choose the "All Transactions" radio button or enter the dates of the

entries you want to download, choose the type of file you would like to download (Comma delimited, Tab delimited, Quicken, or QuickBooks), and press the "Download History" button. This file will contain all of your payments.

IPN

If you have Instant Payment Notifications activated, you will receive an IPN when a payment is first sent, which will state the status of the payment (Completed or Pending). If the payment was 'Pending,' you will receive another IPN when the payment clears, fails, or is denied.

Add PayPal Checkout to Your 3rd-Party Cart

PayPal Checkout can now be added to 3rd-Party Shopping Carts

Some web developers may wish to integrate PayPal payment processing with their own 3rd-party shopping cart instead of the standard PayPal Shopping Cart. Please use the instructions below to allow your buyers to pay with PayPal when they are ready to check out after adding all of their items to your 3rd-party shopping cart.

There are now two ways to integrate your 3rd-party shopping cart with the PayPal payment flow. The first is to pass in the aggregate amount of the Cart payment, rather than of the individual items. The second is to pass details of the items that have been selected to PayPal, instead of an aggregated amount for the entire Cart. Note: Posting the necessary variables to PayPal as described below will probably require you to implement some scripting on your website.

Method 1. Passing the Aggregate Cart Amount to PayPal

If you wish, you may aggregate your entire shopping cart and pass the total amount into PayPal's Buy Now code (that is, you will need to post a single name for the entire cart and the total price of the cart's contents as though it were a purchase of a single item).

One drawback of this method is that your buyers will not be able to see the individual items appearing in their carts. In addition, you cannot change our variable names, nor can you add your own variable names.

Required Variables

The code for your PayPal post requires the following three hidden variables and an image as the form submit:

Required Variables	
Name	Description
business	Email address on your PayPal account
item_name	Name of the item (or a name for the Shopping Cart)
amount	Price of the item (the total price of all items in the Shopping Cart)
image	The image for the button your buyer will press to initiate the PayPal payment process. You can substitute your own image by replacing the src with the URL of your image

This means that the minimum required code for your post to PayPal will look like this:

PayPal offers additional variables to customize your form post. All of the available variables are listed below (variable names must be in lower case):

Available Variables	
Name	Description
business	Email address on your PayPal account
quantity	Number of items. This will multiply the amount if greater than one
item_name	Name of the item (or a name for the Shopping Cart). Must be alpha-numeric, with a 127 character limit
item_number	Optional pass-through variable for you to track payments. Must be alpha-numeric, with a 127-character limit
amount	Price of the item (the total price of all items in the Shopping Cart)
shipping	The cost of shipping the item
shipping2	The cost of shipping each additional item
handling	The cost of handling
handling_cart	Optional single handling fee to be charged cart-wide. If the handling variable is used in multiple 'Add to Cart' buttons, the handling_cart value of the first item will be used.
tax	Transaction-based tax value. If present, the value passed here will override any profile tax settings you may have (regardless of the buyer's location)
no_shipping	Shipping address. If set to "1," your customer will not be asked for a shipping address. This is optional; if omitted or set to "0," your customer will be prompted to include a shipping address
cn	Optional label that will appear above the note field (maximum 40 characters)
no_note	Including a note with payment. If set to "1," your customer will not be prompted to include a note. This is optional; if omitted or set to "0," your customer will be prompted to include a note
on0	First option field name. 64-character limit
os0	First set of option value(s). 200-character limit. "on0" must be defined for "os0" to be recognized
on1	Second option field name. 64-character limit

Available Variables	
Name	Description
os1	Second set of option value(s). 200-character limit. "on1" must be defined for "os1" to be recognized
custom	Optional pass-through variable that will never be presented to your customer. Can be used to track inventory. 256-character limit
invoice	Optional pass-through variable that will never be presented to your customer. Can be used to track invoice numbers. 256-character limit
notify_url	Only used with IPN. An internet URL where IPN form posts will be sent
return	An internet URL where your customer will be returned after completing payment
cancel_return	An internet URL where your customer will be returned after cancelling payment
image_url	The internet URL of the 150 by 50 pixel image you would like to use as your logo
currency_code	Defines the currency in which the monetary variables (amount, shipping, shipping2, handling, tax) are denoted. Possible values are "USD", "EUR", "GBP", "CAD", "JPY". If omitted, all monetary fields will be interpreted as U.S. Dollars
cs	Sets the background color of your payment pages. If set to "1," the background color will be black. This is optional; if omitted or set to "0," the background color will be white
image	The image for the button your buyer will press to initiate the PayPal payment process. You can substitute your own image by replacing the src with the URL of your image
lc	Sets the default country and associated language for the login or signup page that your customers see when they click your button. If this variable is absent, the default will be set from the user's cookie, or will be set to the U.S. if there is no cookie. Can be set to any of the countries currently available on PayPal.

Extended Variables

PayPal allows you to post extended variables if you change this "cmd" input:

<input type="hidden" name="cmd" value="_xclick">

to:

<input type="hidden" name="redirect_cmd" value="_xclick">
```

By making the above change to the "cmd" input, you can also use the variables below:

Extended Variables	
Name	Description
email	Customer's email address
first_name	Customer's first name. Must be alpha-numeric, with a 32-character limit
last_name	Customer's last name. Must be alpha-numeric, with a 64-character limit
address1	First line of customer's address. Must be alpha-numeric, with a 100-character limit
address2	Second line of customer's address. Must be alpha-numeric, with a 100-character limit
city	City of customer's address. Must be alpha-numeric, with a 100-character limit
state	State of customer's address. Must be official 2 letter abbreviation
zip	Zip code of customer's address. Numeric characters only, with a 32 character limit
night_phone_a	Area code of customer's night telephone number
night_phone_b	First three digits of customer's night telephone number
night_phone_c	Last four digits of customer's night telephone number
day_phone_a	Area code of customer's day telephone number
day_phone_b	First three digits of customer's day telephone number
day_phone_c	Last four digits of customer's day telephone number

Note: To specify shipping & handling amounts that differ from the default shipping amounts set in your Profile, please go to your Profile, edit your Shipping Calculations, and click the "allow transaction-based shipping override" checkbox.

Method 2. Passing Individual Items to PayPal

If your 3rd-party shopping cart can be configured to pass individual items to PayPal, information about the items will be included in the buyer's and seller's History logs and notifications. To include information about the items, you will post HTML form elements to a new version of PayPal's Shopping Cart flow. This process is much like the one described in Method 1, "Passing Aggregate Cart Amount to PayPal," with the following exceptions:

1. Set the "cmd" variable to "_cart"

2. Replace this required HTML line:

<input type="hidden" name="cmd" value="_xclick">
```

with

```
<input type="hidden" name="cmd" value="_cart">
```

3. Add a new variable called "upload"

Add the following line between the <form> and </form> tags:

```
<input type="hidden" name="upload" value="1">
```

4. Define item details

For each of the following item-specific parameters, define a new set of values that correspond to each item that was purchased via your 3rd-party cart. Append "_x" to the variable name, where x is the item number, starting with 1 and increasing by one for each item that is added.

Required Variables	
Name	Description
item_name_x	(Required for item #x) Name of item #x in the cart. Must be alpha-numeric, with a 127-character limit
item_number_x	Optional pass-through variable associated with item #x in the cart. Must be alpha-numeric, with a 127-character limit
amount_x	(Required for item #x) Price of the item #x
shipping_x	The cost of shipping the first piece (quantity of 1) of item #x
shipping2_x	The cost of shipping each additional piece (quantity of 2 or above) of item #x
handling_x	The cost of handling for item #x
on0_x	First option field name for item #x. 64-character limit
os0_x	First set of option value(s) for item #x. 200-character limit. "on0_x" must be defined for "os0_x" to be recognized
on1_x	Second option field name for item #x. 64-character limit
os1_x	Second set of option value(s) for item #x. 200-character limit. "on1_x" must be defined for "os1_x" to be recognized

5. Repeat for each item included in cart

Include a set of required variables and any optional variables from the table above for each item included in your buyer's cart. The first item included in

the cart should be defined with parameters ending in "_1", such as "item_name_1", "amount_1", etc. Similarly, the second item should be denoted with variables like "item_name_2", "amount_2", etc. Note: the "_x" values must increment by one continuously in order to be recognized. If you skip from item #1 to item #3 without defining an item #2, the third item will be ignored

To specify currency: All monetary variables (amount, shipping, shipping2, handling, tax) will be interpreted in the currency designated by the "currency_code" variable that is posted with the payment. Since it is not item-specific, there is no need to append a "_x" to the variable name. If no "currency_code" variable is posted, we will assume that all monetary values are in U.S. Dollars.

PayPal Shopping Cart “Add to Cart” HTML Code

An explanation of the PayPal Shopping Cart Variables

Rather than creating a separate button for every single item you wish to sell with the PayPal Shopping Cart, you can manipulate the Add to Cart code to create different Add to Cart buttons.

This piece is required and should not be changed. Changing this argument will cause your PayPal Shopping Cart to malfunction.

item_name	Description of item (maximum 127 characters). This is optional: if omitted, customer will see a field in which they have the option of entering an Item Name
item_number	Pass-through variable for you track purchases. It will not be displayed to your customer, but will get passed back to you at the completion of payment (maximum 127 characters). This is optional: if omitted, no variable will be passed back to you

Variable	Description
image_url	The internet URL of the 150 by 50 pixel image you would like to use as your logo. This is optional: if omitted, your customer will see your Business Name (if you have a Business account) or email address (if you have a Premier account)
no_shipping	Shipping address. If set to "1," your customer will not be asked for a shipping address. This is optional: if omitted or set to "0" your customer will be prompted to include a shipping address
return	An internet URL where the user will be returned after completing the payment. For example, a URL on your site that hosts a "Thank you for your payment" page. This item is optional, if omitted, users will be taken to the PayPal site
rm	Return URL behavior. If set to "1" and if a "return" value is submitted, upon completion of the payment the buyer will be sent back to the return URL using a GET method, and no transaction variables will be submitted. If set to "2" and if a "return" value is submitted, the buyer will be sent back to the return URL using a POST method, to which all available transaction variables will also be posted. If omitted or set to "0", GET methods will be used for all Subscriptions transactions and Buy Now, Donations, or PayPal Shopping Cart transactions in which IPN is not enabled. POST methods with variables will be used for the rest
cancel_return	An internet URL where the user will be returned if payment is cancelled. For example, a URL on your site which hosts a "Payment Cancelled" page. This item is optional, if omitted, users will be taken to the PayPal site
no_note	Including a note with payment. If set to "1," your customer will not be prompted to include a note. This is optional: if omitted or set to "0" your customer will be prompted to include a note
cn	Label that will appear above the note field (maximum 40 characters). This value is not saved and will not appear in any of your notifications. This is optional; if omitted, no variable will be passed back to you
cs	Sets the background color of your payment pages. If set to "1," the background color will be black. This is optional: if omitted or set to "0" the background color will be white
on0	First option field name (maximum 64 characters). This is optional; if omitted, no variable will be passed back to you
os0	First set of option value(s). If this option is selected through a text box (or radio button), each value should be no more than 64 characters. If this value is entered by the customer through a text box, there is a 200-character limit. This is optional; if omitted, no variable will be passed back to you. "on0" must be defined for "os0" to be recognized
on1	Second option field name (maximum 64 characters). This is optional; if omitted, no variable will be passed back to you

Variable	Description
os1	Second set of option value(s). If this option is selected through a text box (or radio button), each value should be no more than 64 characters. If this value is entered by the customer through a text box, there is a 200-character limit. This is optional; if omitted, no variable will be passed back to you. "on1" must be defined for "os1" to be recognized
shipping	The cost of shipping this item if you have enabled item-specific shipping costs (see page 15). If <code>shipping</code> is used and <code>shipping2</code> is not defined, this flat amount will be charged regardless of the quantity of items purchased. If you are using item-based shipping, make sure override check-box is checked in your Profile. This is optional; if omitted, and your Profile-based shipping is enabled, your customer will be charged the amount or percentage defined in your Profile
shipping2	The cost of shipping each additional item. This is optional; if omitted, and your Profile-based shipping is enabled, your customer will be charged the amount or percentage defined in your Profile
handling	The cost of handling. This is not quantity-specific. The same handling will be charged regardless of the number of items purchased. This is optional; if omitted, no handling charges will be assessed
handling_cart	Optional single handling fee to be charged cart-wide. If the <code>handling_cart</code> variable is used in multiple 'Add to Cart' buttons, the <code>handling_cart</code> value of the first item will be used
custom	Pass-through variable that will never be presented to your customer. This is optional; if omitted, no variable will be passed back to you. 256-character limit
invoice	Pass-through variable that will never be presented to your customer. This is optional; if omitted, no variable will be passed back to you. 256-character limit
amount	The price or amount of the purchase, not including shipping, handling, or tax. If omitted, this value will be editable by the buyer at the time of purchase
tax	Transaction-based tax override variable. Set to a flat tax amount you would like to apply to the transaction regardless of the buyer's location. If present, this value overrides any tax settings that may be set in the seller's Profile. If omitted, Profile tax settings (if any) will apply
currency_code	The currency of the payment. Defines the currency in which the monetary variables (amount, shipping, shipping2, handling, tax) are denoted. Possible values are "USD" (U.S. Dollar), "EUR" (Euro), "GBP" (Pound Sterling), "CAD" (Canadian Dollar), "JPY" (Yen). If omitted, all monetary fields will be interpreted as U.S. Dollars

Note:

If you would like to remove the values for a variable (i.e., to leave the amount blank for your customer to define), you should remove the entire variable, not just the value. For example, you should remove this entire line from the code:

Pre-Populate Your Customer's PayPal Sign-Up

Improve your customer experience by pre-populating the PayPal payment pages

If you have already collected your customer's information, you can pass this information to PayPal to pre-populate the first page of a new customer's sign-up. The fields and parameters are listed below. You can pass all or none of this data. While your customer's sign-up page will be pre-populated, it will still be editable.

To pass this information to the PayPal payment pages, post the variable name and the associated data to PayPal in the HTML in the form of "variable name = value." You will also need to change your cmd value to '_ext-enter' and add a new variable, 'redirect_cmd', whose value should be '_xclick'. Please see the sample code below for an example.

What is a cookie?

A cookie is information that a website puts on your hard disk so that it can remember something about you at a later time. (More technically, it is information for future use that is stored by the server on the client side of a client/server communication.) Typically, a cookie records your preferences when using a particular site. Using the Web's Hypertext Transfer Protocol (HTTP), each request for a webpage is independent of all other requests. For this reason, the webpage server has no memory of what pages it has previously sent you, or anything about your previous visits. A cookie is a mechanism that allows the server to store its own information about you on your computer. You can view the cookies that have been stored on your hard disk (although the content stored in each cookie may not make much sense to you). The location of the cookies depends on the browser. Internet Explorer stores each cookie as a separate file under a Windows subdirectory. Netscape stores all cookies in a single cookies.txt file. [Source: WhatIs.com 10/13/2000]

I keep getting an error message when I enter dollar amounts in the PayPal Shopping Cart Button Factory form. What's wrong?

The PayPal Shopping Cart can only process dollar amounts with zero or two decimals (i.e. 25 or 25.00). Please make sure that you have not tried to enter a number with a single decimal.

How do I add a PayPal Shopping Cart button to my AOL Hometown page?

To add a PayPal Shopping Cart button to your AOL Hometown page:

1. Login to your AOL Hometown webpage account
2. Click on the Edit My Pages link
3. After you have selected the page to which you would like to add the PayPal Shopping Cart button, select the "Insert" feature from the tool bar
4. Select "Advanced HTML"
5. A box will appear for you to enter your HTML code. Copy the HTML code generated by the Button Factory, and paste it into the box provided
6. Save your page

The PayPal Shopping Cart button should now appear on your webpage.

How do I add a PayPal Shopping Cart button to my Homestead page?

To add a PayPal Shopping Cart button to your Homestead page:

1. Login to your Homestead account
2. Go to the page editor
3. Select "Advanced" from the left-hand menu
4. Select "Insert HTML" from the options below the left-hand menu
5. A window labeled "Element Editor" will appear. Press the "Edit HTML" button
6. A window labeled "HTML Snippet" will appear. Copy the HTML code generated by the Button Factory, and paste it into the box provided
7. Press the "OK" button
8. Save your page

The PayPal Shopping Cart button should now appear on your webpage.

How do I add a PayPal Shopping Cart button to my Webcommunities.com page?

To add a PayPal Shopping Cart button to your WebCommunities.com page:

1. Login to your WebCommunities.com account
2. Choose the page to which you would like to add the Shopping Cart button, and press the "Edit" button
3. Press the page layout "Edit" button. (Do not use the "Add Text" feature)
4. A box labeled "Enter Text" will appear. Copy the HTML code generated by the Button Factory, and paste it into this box
5. Remove the comment tags <!-- Begin PayPal Logo -->, <!-- End PayPal Logo -->

6. Save your page

The PayPal Shopping Cart button should now appear on your webpage.

How do I add a PayPal Shopping Cart button to my BigStep.com page?

BigStep will allow you to use the PayPal Shopping Cart code generated for email. To add a PayPal Shopping Cart link to your BigStep.com page:

1. Login to your BigStep.com account
2. Select the Site Building tab
3. Under the Build Pages heading, select the page you would like to edit
4. Select a building block and press Continue
5. Choose the page to which you would like to add the PayPal Shopping Cart link
6. Copy the HTML code generated by the Button Factory, and paste it into the "Add Written Content" field
7. Select OK
8. Select Preview
9. Select Publish Changes

How do I add a PayPal Shopping Cart button to my Yahoo! PageBuilder (GeoCities) page?

To add a PayPal Shopping Cart button to your Yahoo PageBuilder (GeoCities) page:

1. Log in to your Yahoo! PageBuilder (GeoCities) account
2. Choose the page to which you would like to add the PayPal Shopping Cart button
3. Select "Insert" from the tool bar
4. Next select "Forms and Scripts"
5. Choose "HTML Code" from the menu
6. A box labeled Script Properties will appear. In the Description field, give your PayPal button a name
7. Copy the HTML code generated by the Button Factory, paste it into the "Script" field, then select OK
8. Save your changes
